

Ka Hae Hawai'i - The canton of the flag of Hawai'i contains the Union Jack of the United Kingdom, prominent over the top quarter closest to the flag mast.



The field of the flag is composed of eight horizontal stripes, symbolizing the eight major islands. The color of the stripes, from the top down, follows the sequence: white, red, blue, white, red, blue, white, red.

Other questions that can be asked are:
